


"THE EASTER EXPERIENCE LEAVES US FOREVER CHANGED!"

So she ran and went to Simon Peter and to the other disciple whom Jesus loved, and told them,


"They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they put him." So Peter and the other disciple went out and came to the tomb.

EXPLORING THE ART:

ART OF THE HUMAN SPIRIT

William H. Johnson used a primitive style of painting, known as "folk art", to depict the experience of African-Americans during the 1930s and '40s.

The term "folk art" was coined during the 1700s and 1800s to describe art made by craftsmen, manual laborers, peasants, tradespeople, and working -class folk. Because many folk artists have no formal art training, artistic rules such as perspective (drawing objects three-dimensionally in order to give them the illusion of depth and distance) and proportion (drawing objects so that their size and shape are harmonious to one another) usually are not followed. Folk artists often use simple artistic techniques, bright colors, and childlike perspectives, creating art as a means of self-expression rather than creating art that is "correct."

Although Johnson was a formally trained artist, he used this style in his artwork. Historic events and scenes from the Bible were favorite subjects for folk painters. Folk artists rely on experience, community, heritage, and imagination, rather than formal training, to create their unique works of art. It is art that is felt rather than taught. It is used as a means to express and Raise Up the human spirit.

Making the Connections

Tico was a different kind of bird. He could not fly, but that did not stop Tico from dreaming. His dream came true when the wishing bird gave him some beautiful magic golden wings, and he felt a tug at his heart to share that magic.

Jesus came from his heaven where angels can fly, and became like one of us. Humans can not fly, but Jesus was different. He knew he had a special call and mission. Jesus and Tico both knew they were given a unique purpose, and they both dared to be different. Jesus, like Tico, had a transformational experience. Jesus was baptized and given a special mission. As we learn in Lent, Jesus went into the desert alone, for forty days and forty nights, to explore that mission. Upon his return Jesus was transfigured, and charged for his mission, in front of his very closest friends. He taught about the Kingdom of God, and performed miracles in front of thousands of people, but all of that was not enough. For Jesus' mission to be complete, he had to give his super powers away, just like Tico. If he did, than all could do the super works he did.

Tico golden wings gave him the ability to fly, but he realized that others needed what he had. So bit by bit, one by one, Tico gave others the very gift he had dreamt of. Jesus did the same thing. Jesus gave away his very life, so that we too might live like him.

Jesus and Tico both gave themselves away to be able to fly forever - that is the Easter Experience! Through Jesus we are each changed and charged with our own mission. We are awakened to our own gifts and the grace to do his works - to be his people and to share his transforming, healing love all over the world. It is so enlivening that, like Tico, we will not be able to sleep. "Awake oh sleepers from the dead", we sing at Easter. For Christ is our life, and that is the Easter Experience!!

Making the Connections

FOR CHILDREN

YOUR STORY: Have there ever been times that you have felt different? What has made you feel that way? When is different special?

THE CHILDRENS' STORY: How was Tico special? What made Tico want to give his golden wings away?

THE GOSPEL STORY: How was Jesus different? How was he special? When Jesus was in the temple as a teenager, the elders saw something different in him. Have you felt that sometimes people see something different in you? Something special? What happened to people when Jesus and Tico gave away their very selves for others?

How is the world forever changed because of what Jesus did? This Easter, how can we give God's healing love and grace away? Joy is the product of sacrificial love. Tico, who didn't look like the other birds, was wide awake on the inside. How are Christians "awake"? Does that make us look different? How is becoming "awake" the Easter Experience?

QUESTION OF THE WEEK: How has your Easter Experience left you awakened? How have you been awakened as a family?

CHARACTER QUALITIES: SELF-EMPTYING BRINGS JOY
BEING ALIVE IN CHRIST

FAMILY ACTIVITIES: Conduct some Easter Joy "experiments". Look for examples throughout history of people who have emptied themselves and become alive in Christ.

Make a tomb for your family table, and on Good Friday after praying the Stations of the Cross, put a figure of Jesus in the tomb and cover it with a rock. On Easter, discover the tomb empty and Christ Risen (after parents have hidden him). Look throughout the house to find the Risen Christ where you wouldn't expect to find him. Have a prize for the family member who finds the figure of Jesus.

Throughout the weeks of Easter, each night share how you have "found the Lord" at work in the lives of others and in your own life each day. Talk about what it means to be awakened to see Christ healing and redeeming the world all around us, knowing it is because of your Easter Experience that you can see!!



GEOGRAPHICAL SETTING: The story takes place at the tomb of Jesus which was located just outside the west facing gate that allowed entrance to the city of Jerusalem. The tomb was carved into an abandoned rock quarry. The owner of the tomb was a religious leader of the Jewish community who was sympathetic to Jesus and his message about the Kingdom of God. Mary and her companion run to make a report to Peter and John about the fact that the tomb was empty. These Apostles (and other disciples) would have been found in the Upper Room, behind locked doors - the same Upper Room where Jesus had celebrated the Passover, our Last Supper, on the night that he was betrayed and arrested.

TERMS: "SAW" There is a lesson in Greek that makes this Gospel even more compelling. It has to do with the English translation of the word "saw" in the Gospel of John. Our language requires that we translate three very different Greek words in the original text with a single word in. John arrives at the entrance of the tomb and he "saw" something. Peter arrives after John, goes inside the tomb, and he "saw" something. Then John enters the tomb with Peter, and he "saw" something, again. In the original Greek, John arrives at the entrance, and he "blepo". Peter arrives, goes inside, and he "ido". Then John goes inside the tomb, and he "thereo" the scene. What is going on? John arrives at the entrance and reveals what he actually saw, without any further comprehension. That is the meaning behind the Greek word "blepo". Peter comes on the scene and enters the tomb for a better look. He takes his time, and "ido", describes the details within. Finally, John enters the same chamber as Peter, and he "thereo" the scene, forming a theory about what has happened. The result is that both Peter and John leave the tomb convinced that Jesus has risen!

CULTURAL INSIGHT: The tomb of Jesus was new and did not belong to any member of his family. It belonged to Joseph of Arimathea who was not related to Jesus, which means that the body was placed in the new tomb temporarily and would not remain there forever. This explains why the women arrive early on Sunday morning wondering who would roll the stone away for them. The tombs of this time were a two-chambered construction, an outer "weeping chamber", and an inner chamber with burial niches for the dead. John arrives at the entrance to the weeping chamber but does not go in. Peter comes upon the scene and enters the weeping chamber for closer examination. John then enters the weeping chamber and sees what Peter has been looking at. Only then do they both realize Jesus has conquered death and the grave!

INSIGHT INTO MEANING: Biblical faith is something that develops and deepens over time. This is one of the lessons of the Gospel this week. Peter and John needed time to carefully consider all possibilities before they came to the conclusion that Jesus had in fact risen from the dead. Confident of this fact, they then make their way back to the other disciples to announce this good news. We can all find ourselves on some point of this same faith life continuum. Some of us only "see". Others are willing to carefully examine, and in the process, formulate a theory that might explain the transformation in our life. Others are ready to jump in to the deep water, they see and they believe. Where are you this Easter?
